FACT SHEET

AB 3234 makes most misdemeanor crimes eligible for dismissal—eliminating firearm prohibitions.

Assembly Bill 3234 excludes only a few misdemeanor crimes from potential diversion. (Crimes requiring registration under Penal Code 290, 273.5, 646.9, and 243(e)(1).) This law would make all these misdemeanor crimes diversion eligible, and therefore there would be no firearm prohibition regardless of the conduct leading to an arrest.

- 1. Committing a hate crime¹
- Carrying a loaded firearm with intent to commit a felony²
- 3. Transporting a machine gun³
- 4. Possession of a deadly weapon with intent to assault⁴
- 5. Carrying a firearm in a public place or public street while masked⁵

- 8. Selling or giving a firearm illegally to someone under 21 years of age⁸
- 9. A person adjudicated as danger to themselves or others as result of mental disorder possession of a firearm⁹
- 10. Possession of a firearm in a mental health facility¹⁰
- 11. Battery¹¹
- 12. Battery with serious bodily injury¹²
- 13. Assault¹³
- 14. Assault with a deadly weapon¹⁴
- 15. Assault with a firearm¹⁵
- 16. Assault against firefighter, emergency medical technician, paramedic, lifeguard, traffic officer, parking control officer, animal control officer, or peace officer¹⁶
- 17. Threat to an executive officer (e.g., a principal of a school)¹⁷
- 18. Threat to a public official¹⁸
- 19. Dissuading a witness or victim from testifying or reporting a crime¹⁹
- 20. Possession of a deadly weapon with intent to dissuade witness or victim²⁰
- 21. Threatening or using force against a witness or victim of a crime²¹
- 22. Attempting to take a firearm of a peace officer while resisting arrest²²
- 23. Any false report of a lost or stolen firearm²³
- 24. Illegally bringing a weapon into a state or local public building²⁴
- 25. Illegally bringing a loaded firearm into the State Capitol, legislative office, Office of the Governor, or other constitutional officer, or any committee of the Senate or Assembly²⁵
- 26. Bringing a firearm into the Governor's Mansion²⁶
- 27. Assisting criminal street grand with felony conduct²⁷
- 28. Assault with a stun gun²⁸
- 29. Discharge of a firearm at an inhabited building or vehicle²⁹
- 30. Assault on a school employee with a deadly weapon, a firearm, stun gun or taser³⁰
- 31. Grossly negligent discharge of a firearm³¹

- 32. Discharge of a firearm at an unoccupied motor vehicle or uninhabited building³²
- 33. Violation of a Domestic Violence Restraining Order³³
- 34. Exhibition of a deadly weapon in a threatening manner³⁴
- 35. Exhibition of a firearm in a threatening manner³⁵
- 36. Exhibition of a firearm to a peace officer³⁶
- 37. Serious bodily injury inflicted while exhibiting a deadly weapon or firearm³⁷
- 38. Threat of death or great bodily injury³⁸
- 39. Entering school and committing any act to interfere with peaceful conduct on campus³⁹
- 40. Wearing a peace officer uniform while picketing relating to a concerted refusal to work⁴⁰
- 41. Possession of armor piercing bullets⁴¹
- 42. Anyone who supplies, sells, or gives a firearm to someone who has been determined to be a danger to themselves or others as a result of a mental disorder⁴²
- 43. Theft of a firearm⁴³
- 44. Illegal sale, transfer of a firearm44
- 45. Bringing drugs or weapons into a juvenile facility⁴⁵

The current list of misdemeanor sexual assault crimes do not require sex offender registration and all would be eligible for diversion under the proposed law:

- 1. Statutory rape⁴⁶
- 2. Sodomy with a minor who is 14 years old or over⁴⁷
- 3. Oral Copulation with a minor who is 14 years old or over⁴⁸
- 4. Digital Penetration with a minor who is 14 years old or over⁴⁹
- 5. Those who violate required sex offender registration who are transient⁵⁰

The current list of other misdemeanor crimes that would be eligible for diversion under this proposed legislation:

- 1. Child endangerment⁵¹
- 2. Violation of domestic violence restraining orders⁵²
- 3. Elder abuse⁵³
- 4. Vehicular manslaughter⁵⁴
- 5. Driving while under the influence of alcohol or drugs⁵⁵
- 6. Publishing information describing or depicting a child or related to a child with intent the information be used as a crime against a child⁵⁶
- 7. Burglary of a closed business or car⁵⁷
- 8. Stealing a car⁵⁸
- 9. Carrying a loaded firearm in a public place⁵⁹
